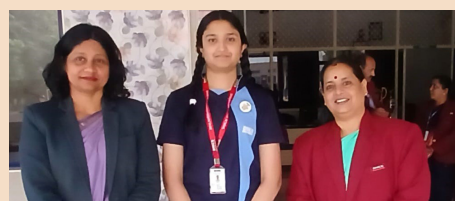

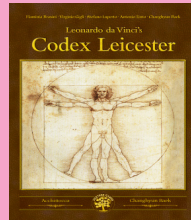

1. The most expensive book in the world is *Codex Leicester* by Leonardo da Vinci. Bill Gates purchased the book in 1994 for \$30.8 million.



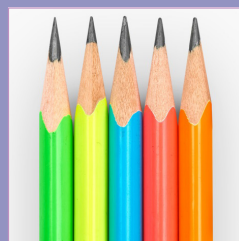

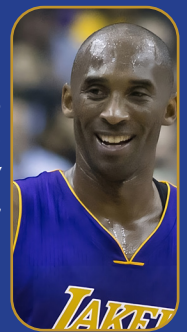

ST. MARY'S ISLANDS, KARNATAKA

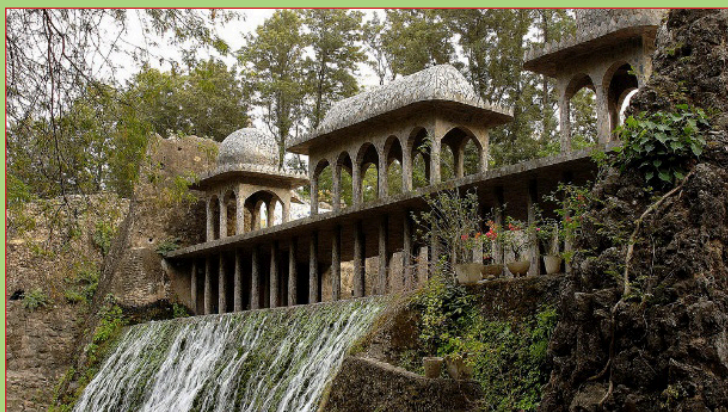


St. Mary's Islands is a group of four small islands off the coast of Malpe in Karnataka. Due to the abundance of coconut trees in the area, it is also known as Karnataka's Coconut Island. The Islands are full of basalt rock formations, designated as one of the 34 National Geological Monuments in India by the Geological Survey of India. Millions of years ago, hot molten lava oozed from the Earth's surface and was cooled by the waters of the Arabian Sea, resulting in the igneous rocks

with a unique hexagonal shape. While the Islands are uninhabited, they are open for tourism. There are many security measures in place in order to preserve the natural environment and protect visitors. The best time to visit Coconut Island is from October to January.

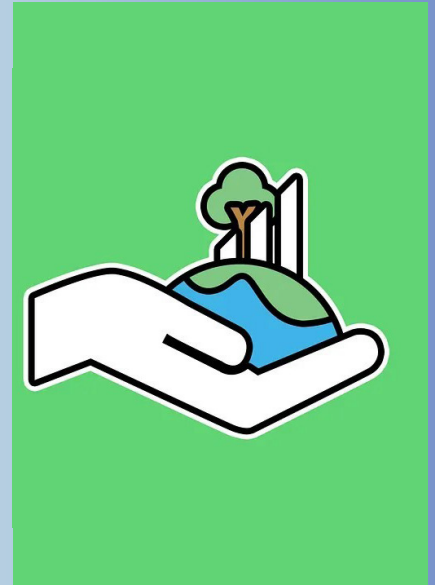

DEVELOPMENT WITHOUT DESTRUCTION

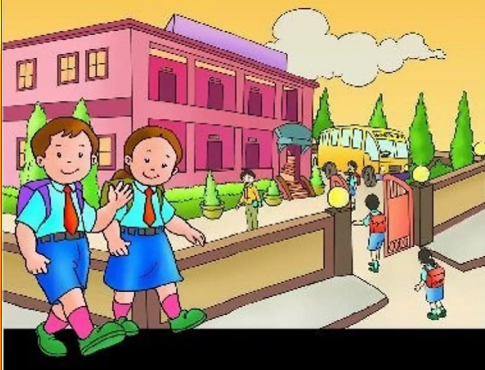

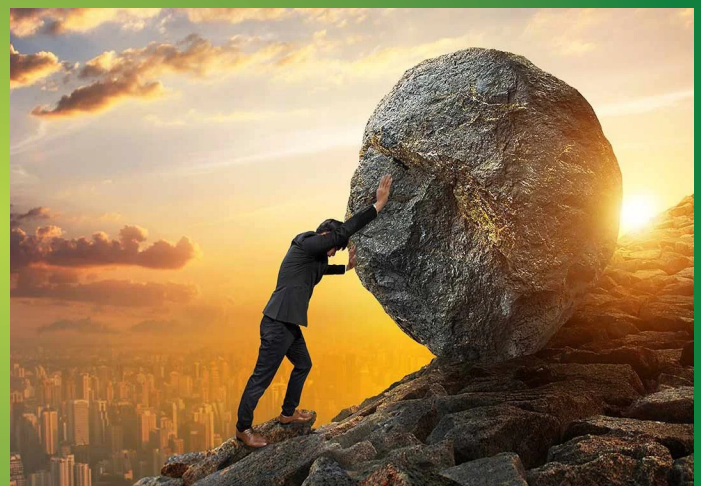

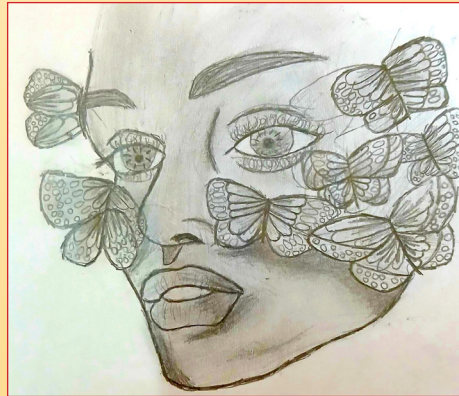
